We ask God for guidance on which school subject to take, which house to buy. We want to hear God's voice rumbling through the thunder.

[15:43] He might say, Isaac, don't take that Italian course in university. It will be your worst grade.

I didn't listen, and it was my worst grade. Don't get me wrong, I believe God can speak to us, directly and indirectly.

But because we hear it so much, we sometimes forget how important the simple things actually are.

I'm not saying we shouldn't pray about everything in life.

But when seeking the will of God, we should first look here, in the word. He says preach the gospel.

[17:13] Preach the word. Black and white. Church, as we wrap up on this year, Paul reminds us that we need the gospel of Jesus more so than ever before.

It seems like the wars are around every corner.

Terrorist attacks hit so close to home. Every week there's another article about how AI will take over the world.

This broken world needs Jesus.

And the way it will get him is through you and me.

Let's not wait for someone else to do it. Let's not just leave it up to the pastors and preachers.

[18:17] Let's take the words seriously and follow the commands of our Lord. Don't be like the man in James 1 who listens to the word but doesn't do what it says.

That man is like someone who looks at his face in a mirror and after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like.
